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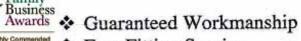

Parking and road safety consultation – let the Parish Council know YOUR views

Youlgrave Parish Council has launched a short public consultation to gauge the views of residents in Alport and Youlgrave about two specific village-wide suggestions а residents' parking scheme and a 20mph speed limit. Neither is in the Parish Council's power to deliver, but if our ongoing requests to Derbyshire County Council Highways to take measures to alleviate our parking and speeding problems are to succeed we evidence of support from need residents.

The form won't take long to complete and our case will be strengthened if we can show the strength of feeling throughout the village for specific courses of action. (Other initiatives, such as identifying small parcels of land for new car parks, are also being pursued.)

Please return your completed form to the Parish Clerk at Christmas Cottage, Church Street, or hand in at the Post Office (or to any Parish Councillor) by 26th July.

Reminiscences of 'Midsummer Day' 1906



Following the article in the last issue of the Bugle, there were a number of enquiries about the identity of the author 'L. Wragg'. The article was written by Lily Wragg, who was born in Youlgrave in 1896 into a family of 11 children. For many years she was Housekeeper to Miss W. Wheeler, who was Headmistress at Lady Manners Grammar School, Bakewell. They lived at Smithy Cottage, Moor Lane, until Miss Wheeler's death when she moved to Fountain Cottage on Fountain Square. Miss Wragg died in 1987 aged 91 years.

Try out your orienteering skills this summer

In 2020, volunteers from Derwent Valley Orienteers set up a Permanent Orienteering Course on the QE II Playing Field on Alport Lane in Youlgrave. We had been invited to do this by a teacher at the primary school, and trained staff on how to use the course with young people. You can find details of the course here:

This year, we have created a MapRun version of the course, where you can time yourself using the GPS in your phone and a free app called MapRun. On **Saturday 24th August 24th** we will be holding a competition using the app and the QEII Permanent Course. Who will be fastest to visit all 20 controls? Will it be a local person or an orienteer? This will be £3 per group to enter, and the fee includes a professionally printed map.

We are creating a more challenging MapRun course in Bradford Dale, starting and finishing at QEII. You can run (or walk) for 60, 90 or 120 minutes. This will be £10

per group to enter and again includes a printed map.

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On **Sunday 25th August** we're holding a Sprint Orienteering competition in Bakewell. This will use chip timing and flags on the ground, rather than the MapRun app. Again you can run or walk, and the fee is £10 per group.

We are collaborating with our neighbouring club South Yorkshire Orienteers to hold an event on Bank Holiday Monday, details TBA.

Everyone is welcome at these events, and our volunteers can get you started with the MapRun app or show you how to use our timing chips. Why not have a friends and family fitness challenge this August?

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From the Churches

Every year, as I look at our well dressings, I think how fine they are, and this year particularly so. Every well dressing has been designed with flair and imagination, put together with infinite patience and attention to detail, hung, blessed – and it was a joy to be able to do so – and admired. But within a week, it's taken down again before it

falls to bits! It's ephemeral art, reflecting the passing and fading beauty of the flowers that many of them portray as well as being made from.

So is creation itself like that? At one level, yes. The prophet Isaiah wrote:

"All people are like grass, and all their beauty [or faithfulness] is like the flowers of the field. The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures forever." – words set in Brahms' German Requiem that I sang in Sheffield at

the end of June. The prophet reminds us that everything in creation changes, declines and dies, but God's creative word is unchanging and stands for ever.

Another contrast is between the passing beauty of things like the wild flowers and rose blooms that have been so fine this year, and the long term, the

seeming permanence of mountains and rocks. We are part of a universe that's reckoned to be 14 billion years old. I love and value the 6-day creation story from Genesis 1, as a piece of poetic description that stresses the order and variety of creation and puts God right at its centre. But for me, creation is both ancient and constantly evolving. Human

beings have been given the work of caring for creation and the power of affecting it, a power we have misused so badly that creation is in crisis.

We face both climate change that's making our weather more extreme, and what's been recognised as a 'mass extinction event' which will see the end of millions of species. In the dale we see signs about water voles, but when did you last see one? They are on a list of **British species** threatened with extinction. Let's be careful in how we behave, keeping our

carbon footprint low. And let's ask and 'pray fervently for our own government and the leaders of the world, that they may set the wellbeing of the earth and nature at the heart of public policy'. [From the Church of England's 'Pray your Part' General Election booklet.]

After already walking to Derby, Worcester, Gloucester, Chester, Leicester, Chelmsford, Sheffield, Ely, Chichester. Exeter. Winchester. Southwell and Southwark (twice!), we are well on target to complete the challenge by ΑII Saints Furthermore, pilgrimages to Guildford, Hereford, Wakefield, Coventry and Lincoln have already started. Most pilgrims have had very positive and lifeenhancing experiences. Below, they speak for themselves - all this from our Facebook posts:

I cannot believe in a personal God, but I can and will admire these monuments to man's sense of greater things, the soaring walls of sound echoing through the stone, and give thanks to some power unspecified for this pilgrimage and those with whom I have shared it." (Phil)

"We made it. What have we taken away from our 4 day Pilgrimage... I think we realised that pretty much anything is possible if you put your mind to it." (Marina and Valerie, aged 82)

"Mission accomplished. We surprised ourselves at how far we could walk and yes, we did have a good time" (Julie and Shirley)

"The birdsong was lovely, I heard but did not see reed warblers and also cuckoos which was a great surprise as cuckoos are rare in England these days. All in all it was an adventure; the nature of an adventure is to face the unexpected and I did." (Sue)

"We arrived at Chelmsford cathedral, both feeling very emotional. A warm welcome and a much needed cuppa thank you!" (Sandra and Nicola)

"We were blessed with fine weather, even too hot some afternoons, and enjoyed glorious countryside and fine views. We surmounted obstacles, from barbed wire to sore ankles." (Richard)

"What a wonderful reception we had when we arrived at Chester Cathedral! The Day Chaplain couldn't have been more warm and embracing of our project." (Kate)

"For me the pilgrimage has proved a great way of connecting with the people I've walked with and the people I've met.

It has given me time to talk, to listen and to reflect. So much more than a long walk." (Theresa)

So much more than a long walk, indeed! If you'd like to be part of our project and maybe

As all the necessary 42 routes now have volunteers (excepting Peel on the Isle of Man, no 43!) we would be delighted to support you in a pilgrimage to any cathedral of your choice. Youlgrave Waterworks update

Your Community Waterworks AGM is on Monday 15th July at 8pm in the Reading Room. All supplied by us are welcome to attend.

Our trial header tank project is reaching the final stages of construction and is being self-funded, so we will be very pleased to see all properties who have not started paying this year's water bill commence as soon as possible. We have now sent the outstanding debts from last year to TDR who will be contacting non-payers shortly. Fortunately this is a small number and we ask you to contact us to arrange to pay before we are forced to use this route, as it increases your debt substantially to cover their costs of recovery and once sent to them fees cannot be waived.

Please continue to use water sparingly especially when the hot and dry spells occur – our sprinkler ban is permanent and with 24 hour spring flow hose pipes should only be used in the late evening and early hours of the morning to ensure flow at peak times is available for all.

Pommie People

This month's interviewee is **John Roper**, who at 88 has lived in Youlgrave his whole life. He played in the village Band for 67 years, starred in 40 performances of Youlgrave Panto, and amongst other things has chaired the Village Hall and football club.

Where were you born and what is your earliest memory?

I was born in Coldwell End in 1936 and my earliest memory was my first day at school. My mother took me, but I didn't want her after that.

Where did you go to school and what was your favourite subject? I went to Youlgrave School then Bath Street, Bakewell, until I was 15. I enjoyed woodwork and music, in particular.

What person has had the most influence on you?

My grandfather – because of his love of music. He was the Conductor for Youlgrave Band and he used to spend 10 minutes rehearsing every evening by playing scales on his cornet. My father – because of his religious beliefs. He was a Methodist preacher at the Wesleyan chapel next to the Farmyard Inn, and I went to the Sunday School in the building across the road. Both are now privately owned.

Tell us something about you that not many people will know.


I once collected logs and sticks to sell and with the money I saved up I bought my first motorbike (an old BSA, then after that an Ariel).

What did you do for a living?
I worked at Friden, then drove for
Express Dairy at Rowsley for a while,









before going back to Friden where I drove HGVs (and also for K&H). I drove for 32 years and made deliveries all over the country. One lorry I had went round the clock 5 times – in other words, I drove it for 500,000 miles! I loved going to South Wales and the North East, but hated going to Peckham.

How do you relax? Playing in a band, watching sport and walking with a group of friends.

What living person to you most admire and why?

My wife, Sandra, for caring and looking after me for 56 years. She came from Beeley and we met when we both

worked at Express Dairy. She went on to work in Figg's bakehouse in Youlgrave for many years.

Where's your favourite holiday destination?

Robin Hood's Bay in North Yorkshire, and we've also enjoyed a number of coach holidays to Austria.

What music are you listening to at the moment?

Brass band music, and Dutch violinist and composer André Rieu.

What's your favourite time of the day and why?

When I wake up to another day.

What's your favourite food or meal? Fish and chips, or any pork dish.

What's your favourite sport and did you ever play it?

Cricket and football, plus badminton which I played in the village hall until my 50s.

Are you a cat or a dog person?

Dog – we had a Jack Russell and
Rhodesian Ridge Back which we got
from a rescue centre.

What are you most proud of? Playing in Youlgrave Brass Band for 67 years. I was also chairman of Youlgrave Village Hall and Youlgrave football club, and was a Youlgrave Parish Councillor. For 40 years I was in Youlgrave Panto and have been King of almost every country in the world! I also produced three shows. And I had an allotment at Coldwell End for 54 years.

What's the most embarrassing thing that's ever happened to you?

Setting off on holiday without my teeth. We got as far as Parsley Hay before I realised and turned round to get them!

What's your most prized possession and why?

A Certificate of Achievement from Warslow Silver Band for 57 years' service, and also from Hollinsclough Band for 54 years as both a player and conductor.

What's your favourite local view/place/location?

Looking down to the village from the top of the slope on Moor Lane, by the farm sheds. It was a location once known as 'two trees' where the Home Guard had a hut surrounded by sand bags during World War II and where they would meet. I also like the view from my house on Westcroft looking across the Dale.

What do you like about living in Youlgrave?

Good local shops and in particular extremely helpful staff in the village Post Office.

What could be improved about Youlgrave?

Holiday cottages, indiscriminate parking especially across entrances.

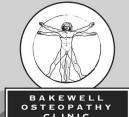



Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: June 2024

At last, the weather has picked up. Plants are responding to the higher temperatures and the abundant moisture still in the ground. The hogweeds at the bottom of Spring Lane are now much taller than me but are definitely not the poisonous giant hogweed.

Fledgling starlings with parents and young woodpeckers have both visited feeders. We are still getting siskins on our garden feeders, which makes me think they may well have bred nearby and a robin has been feeding a fledgling on our tray feeder. It does seem very likely that kites have nested locally as they are seen fairly frequently and a family of five was seen over Bradford Bridge. Buzzards are also fairly common. Other interesting birds that have been spotted here recently have been whitethroat, heron, jay, redstart, and spotted flycatcher.

Wildflowers are wonderful at the moment. Our very rare maiden pinks and spring sandworts are in full bloom and the river is white with water crowfoot. My favourite thistle, the musk thistle with its nodding flowers and colourful bracts, is out in quantity on the Dale side below New Road.

A plant that fascinates me is the orchid. Some of our local nature reserves, where I spend a lot of time, are covered in orchids at the moment. We do less well here, but have a very strong patch of early purple orchids up on the Limestone Way, a few twayblades in the Dale and a population of common spotted orchids on our lawn. These appeared one summer after I had neglected the lawn owing to very wet weather in May and being on holiday. I came to mow and there they were, just two. Since then I have mown very carefully early on in the year and not at all in May. This year

we have 15 flowers. Orchid seeds are tiny, like dust, and take many years to produce flowers. They can only grow in association with a fungus. It is possible that orchid seeds first found their way onto our lawn on my boots as I often work on orchid rich meadows when they are seeding. A lone common spotted orchid has appeared in the Dale this year after an absence of several years.

On my wildlife walk on the 28th I found 81 species of wildflowers in bloom. In May it was 64 and in June last year it was 73.

I was very pleased to hear that a hedgehog has been visiting a garden near Holywell Lane. Another Youlgrave speciality, a large slowworm, was found on the dale side. Two hares were watched down Alport Lane.

Church Farm Diary, July

As I start to write this month's Church Farm Diary, I can hear Youlgrave band playing as it goes round the well dressings, the weather is perfect with the sun shining and a fresh breeze,

How lucky we are to live here. I know we have problems, mainly parking and holiday cottages, but overall there is no nicer place to live – but as I have never lived anywhere else perhaps I am not the one to say this? The wells have been particularly good this year and thanks to all those who are involved.

No one seems to have to work on the wells till the early hours anymore. When we were little that was the best time, because it was a good excuse to stay up late and the panic to finish was always exciting!

The well dressings always coincides with silage time and to get though the village is crazy with the machines, so we try to avoid the village and use the back roads.



I took some friends to look at the robot milker and they were fascinated. It still amazes me how easy milking is in comparison with years ago. I wonder what will be invented next?

When Michael and I started baling for other farmers we had a separate baler and wrapper, but before the wrapper we put the bales in very large plastic bags. Michael would pierce the bales with the fork on the front of the tractor and then pull the bag on. When you look back I don't know how I did it, only being 5ft 2ins it took some effort. Then we moved on to the wrapper, the bale is put on to the wrapper and I would switch the machine on to start the plastic to go round and then I would have to count the rounds 21 times. You can imagine what my head used to feel like after hours of wrapping!

Now Dakin's Baler, that is called a Fusion, bales and wraps in one action. I took Michael and two friends to see Dakin baling on the grounds overlooking Haddon Hall. The views were wonderful and it was nice to see the fields from a different view. I have often admired what you can see when you go into fields that are private, because when you silage for other farms this is something that I really enjoy, There are a lot of fields that I haven't been in around here, because we were always told as children not to trespass on private property, and this stops with you all your life.

Recipe of the month: Lemony basil spaghetti with mascarpone, chilli and chives

Serves 4-5

<u>Ingredients</u>

450g Dried spaghetti

220g frozen petit pois

3 red chillis deseeded and finely sliced 200g mascarpone

1 bunch of fresh basil leaves only

1 bunch of mint leaves only

2 very large handfuls of pine nuts, toasted

1 bunch of fresh chives finely chopped Juice of a lemon

Salt and pepper

Extra virgin oil for drizzling (optional)

Parmesan shaving to serve.

Method

Cook the spaghetti in a large pan of water. Five minutes before it is cooked add the petit pois and cook for 3-4 mins.

Drain the spaghetti. Add the chillis and mascarpone.

Rip the basil and mint and add, then sprinkle in the pine nuts together with the chopped chives.

To serve add the virgin oil and parmesan shavings with salt and pepper.
