# New owner for Youlgrave shop

Yougrave's popular village shop on Church Street has a new name and new owner, with Chloe Tabbenor taking over from Jade Stacey at the end of last year, but in many ways it's business as usual.

Now called The Ginger Nut Shop and Tearooms, Chloe says she aims to build on the successful business and expand the range of products and services on offer.

"I'm really grateful to Jade for all her support and making it such a smooth handover," says Chloe. "We

continue to offer a good range of fresh fruit and veg, bread delivered on a daily basis, and homereared pork sausages, joints and chops. There'll be hot and cold food to take away as before, as well as good quality coffee." She's also retained the services of Tanya and the Saturday girls.

An official opening is set to take place in March, at which point the room at the back will have been converted into a tea room (and in summer this will also include the rear courtyard).

Meanwhile the upstairs rooms are being made available to local businesses to rent out, or could be

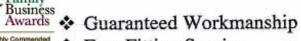

# Via Gellia road closures throughout February

The A5012 Via Gellia road from Newhaven to Cromford will be closed for much of February for essential tree-felling, in response to the danger of falling trees affected by Ash Dieback. The felling will continue until the end of the month and will see a section of the road closed completely to traffic on weekdays between 8am and 4pm, while overnight one lane will be open with traffic lights in place.

# **Peter Stone**

Born in Middleton by Youlgrave, Peter grew up with three older siblings and went to the local school. He farmed when he left the school and developed a love of the outdoors. As a young man Peter loved going to Blackpool with his friends and often told stories of their antics on the trips.

He settled quickly when he met Janet at the cinema in Matlock, she was the love of his life and they enjoyed life together until her death 8 years ago.

They had 2 children and moved to Alport in 1959 when Peter began a career at Haddon

Estate as a forester. He ended up at Haddon for many years, finishing as head forester and receiving a long service award for 37 years from the Forestry Commission. He was extremely proud to be presented the award by the Duke of Rutland.

Peter doted on his family and his 4 grandchildren who often stayed and enjoyed walks around Bradford Dale

and Lathkill Dale with him. He looked after his oldest Great granddaughter every Friday morning and took her for a walk whether the sun shone or the heavens opened. He'd show her the animals on the local farms and her career in agriculture probably began on those Fridays.

Peter was keen to stay active all

through his life and delivered the local paper and the Bugle into his 90s. He also had a love for gardening and was happy to talk to walkers about his Dahlias and the veg he grew. He'd often appear with a bag of broad beans or when runner beans anyone visited. Another

bag soon followed full of eggs that he'd buy from the Harrop's farm on his weekly visit.

Peter's other great love was sport, mainly his passion for Derby County football club which he followed from 1940. Peter was a well known figure in Alport and Youlgrave and was most often seen sat on the seat at top of his road. Many will miss seeing him there.





# From the Churches

Dear Friends.

Some of us will have watched. Some will have missed it, and some, possibly, could not bear to watch.

In the month past we have seen the celebrations and pomp of the inauguration of the 47th president of the United States of America.

This is a man saying that he has come to power through the work of God and hailed by some of his Christian colleagues and others, as the right man for the job.

We will all have our opinions of the merits, or otherwise, of the present incumbent.

In times past, people, more often than not men, have taken to themselves the mantle of serving God and the world, yet so often the fruits of their efforts, and the intention of their efforts, have been self serving and freedom denying.

Sometimes, such people have used the Bible with all its complexity and difficulties, to promote a distorted and unhealthy form of leadership and governance, with its negative effect on society. Within hours a bishop, preaching to the new government and others, spoke of the fear and disease of many from all sections of society and all political shades at the stance the new administration was taking. A plea was made on behalf of those who fear what is happening,

# **Pommie People**

This month's interviewee is **Anne Cooper**, a former All Saints' school governor and member of the Parochial Church Council for nearly 10 years. She's also involved with Youlgreave People's Forum and the 1914-1918 Community Group.

Where were you born and what's your earliest memory?

Ramsey in Huntingdonshire, which has since been absorbed into

Cambridgeshire. My earliest memory is running around with my little doll's pram – I would have been not quite two years old – and falling forward whilst still holding the pram handle grazing all my fingers in one go.

Where did you go to school and what

was your favourite subject? Ramsey Abbey Grammar School – which, like Huntingdonshire, no longer exists. I loved English and History.

What person has had the most influence on you? Aside from my parents I would say my RE teacher who opened my eyes to my faith.

Tell us something about you that not many people will know.

I'm a Bruce Springsteen fan. Perhaps more interesting though, is that my family history indicates I am descended from the Huguenots who came over from France in the 1600s to help drain the fens.

Where did you work?
I started work in 1971 in computer data preparation and eventually became Operations Manager; that was in the days when computers and tape decks







filled an entire room! I have always worked in administration and after a five-year break when our daughters were small, my career for 20 years was in the world of school administration; as PA to several different Headteachers and later in Personnel and Human Resources Management.

How do you relax? Gardening, watching garden birds, reading, sudoku and listening to music.

Which living person do you most admire and why?

Currently it has to be Volodymyr Zelensky for his courage, dignity and

statesmanship.

Where is your favourite holiday destination?
We spent more than 30 years camping all over France for our holidays and had some wonderful times; lately it is travelling around Scotland or the Italian Lakes.

What book are you reading and/or what music are you

listening to at the moment?
I always have three books on the go at the same time. Biographical – currently Lindsey Hilsum (Channel 4 International Editor) 'I Brought the War with Me'; Crime Novel – Anthony Horowitz 'Close To Death'; and what I call gentle reading – Sybil Marshall 'Sharp Through the Hawthorns' a fictional family saga based in my native fenland. Currently also enjoying listening to Andrea Bocelli – I could listen to him forever!

What's your favourite time of the day and why?

In the summer it's early morning for the birdsong and in the winter anytime by the fireside reading.

What's your favourite food or meal? Homecooked traditional or anything Italian

What's your favourite sport and do you/ did you ever play it?

At school netball, high jump, hurdles – loved them all – now not so much... but very much enjoy watching tennis.

Are you a cat or dog person? Always had cats from an early age and was crackers about them – now I'm crackers about Welsh Terriers!

What are you most proud of? Apart from our family – being able to lead and motivate various community groups to achieve their aims.

What's the most embarrassing thing that's ever happened to you?
It used to be fainting in Keymarkets in Huntingdon many years ago. That was until last year when riding the travelator at Charles De Gaulle airport. It stopped but John and I didn't, resulting in a spectacular incident. John fell over first closely followed by myself and others. No-one thought to hit the stop button so we all ended it up in a very ungainly heap, it was no doubt fun to watch!

What's your most precious possession and why?

More treasured than prized I suppose, but it would have to be my engagement and wedding rings, both having been worn for well over 50 years now.

What skill would you like to learn? To play the piano.

What's your favourite local view/place/location?

Well the view across the dale from our house would be very hard to beat, but I also love the sight of Pilhough Hill as you come through Rowsley – that spells my Peak District homecoming to me.

What do like about living in Youlgreave?

The people, we have always felt so welcome here since we arrived in 2012, and we especially loved the way my father was welcomed when he came to live at Granby House. Of course, a large part of our lives here is centred on the church community too and that is something everyone who lives here should be very proud of, whether or not they have a faith.

What could be improved about Youlgreave?

A safer way of walking through the main street as the traffic becomes heavier and faster.

# **Church Farm Diary, December**

Well, at the moment life for farmers seems to be fighting the government and muck spreading. The latter we have been getting on well with because the weather has not been too bad, since the frost has made the ground hard enough to spread the manure on the fields. The first thing that I have mentioned is still an issue, but I will say no more on that subject for now.

I hope everyone coped in the ice and snow. When I was young we had a lengthman from the village who came and cleared the footpaths and then the weeds in better weather. Also, the snow always seemed to be heavier and last longer. This was OK when we went to Bakewell School and the bus couldn't get through, but at Youlgrave School with the teachers living in the village the school was hardly ever closed.

I also remember Mum making ice cream before we had a freezer, and putting it in a container in the snow to freeze. It was the best tasting ice cream! We bottled our milk with cardboard tops and the frost would lift the tops off, enabling the birds to have a taste of milk if you didn't fetch the milk in straight away or put a tin on the bottles to protect them. The worst was the pipes frozen in the cowsheds and having to carry buckets of water to the cows without slipping on the ice and throwing a bucket over you (cows will not milk without water).

It's been the LAMMA show at Birmingham this week, which is a show that all boys need to go to or they say they do. LAMMA stands for Lincolnshire Agricultural Machinery Manufacturers Association. Its every farmer's dream to see all these tractors and machinery, etc, under one roof and of course to catch up with friends. There are over 900 exhibitors with in excess of 40,000 attendees, At least it is undercover, so they all enjoyed it.

# Recipe of the month: Seared Salmon with stir-fried vegetables

#### Ingredients

Choose salmon steaks cut from the centre of the fish. You need about 2.5 cm thick

7oz fresh salmon fillet skin on A little sesame oil

2 tbsp oil plus plus extra for stir frying

# **Youlgrave Parish Council report**

The Parish Council met on 28th January and noted the age of our defibrillators means that 4 are likely to reach end of their working life over the next couple of years. We therefore need to fund raise to buy replacements, as whilst Council maintains and replaces pads and batteries through its funds, at around £900 a unit and with 4 to finance it will be grateful to receive donations and any fundraising to help achieve this. One of the original units was replaced by Council 2 years ago, exhausting the reserve it holds from ongoing donations since the fantastic response to the first fundraising 10 years ago that allowed us to install 4 with their cabinets so quickly.

Council is also finalising the first phase of ideas for the replacement of the Pavilion. The architect has designed a pavilion that has similarities to the existing, but the costing of this project is a challenge and prior to taking the ideas to the PDNPA Planners to see if feasible, we are looking into modern modular units as an alternative. Once this option has been explored, Council will be presenting the ideas to the village at a public meeting and looking to start all forms of fundraising to build a successor that meets current standards for all sports users of our field.

Owing to the changes by DDDC to taxation on second homes Council was able to revise its Precept to £29,202 which is a slightly lower rise of £7.00 pa or 13p per week, which gives us scope to assist our minor projects for the coming year with the decreasing availability of grants for our sector.

# Youlgreave People's Forum Response re Holiday Homes (including Second Homes) and Permanent Homes

This article reflects the feelings and opinions expressed at the Forum Meeting held in December, as well as our response to the consultation exercise. Our submission was not a direct response to the consultation exercise as it pre-empted it, resulting from concerns raised by members of our community. It should therefore be seen as additional to and supportive of the formal response from our Parish Council.

Generally, people present at the meeting accepted that the impacts of Holiday Lets were mainly positive: valuable source of income; old buildings are saved; visitors bring trade to the village shops, pubs and together with local businesses, employment opportunities. Possible downsides were parking problems and traffic congestion; fewer tenancies and house purchase opportunities available or affordable.

Stronger feelings were expressed concerning second homes where some are inhabited for only a few weeks per year and some not at all. This impacts on housing resources and in some cases buildings are not maintained and become uninhabitable. Residents are acutely aware that numbers of Holiday and Second Homes have increased recently and real concerns were raised that there doesn't seem to be any accurate statistical data available.

- How many are registered with the Council?
- What is the percentage difference between lets and second homes?
- Is there a case for quotas?

This must be addressed as part of any short- or long-term plan so that trends can be monitored in order to ensure that potential trigger points for action in the future e.g. falling school rolls, can be identified promptly.

Key to a process which would help such statistics could be 'change of use' being built in throughout to ensure that people could not just open up holiday lets without some kind of registration process, nor could residential homes become second homes or rental properties without some formal recognition of 'change of use'. This would surely help the Council to track statistics in the first place.

Residents highlighted their feelings with practical examples of the regular confusion caused by known holiday let properties using domestic waste collection facilities rather than trade waste. This indicates that businesses are not being registered as such.

Residents were very much in favour of higher Council Tax being charged for Holiday Lets and Second Homes but felt strongly that the extra funds should be fed directly back to the Parish Council.

There was also strong support for using Derbyshire Clauses whenever and wherever appropriate.

#### Update since the meeting

In light of the fact that we do not have a Bugle in December, this all probably seems a long time ago however, we have since had an update on the statistics provided by Councillor Laura Mellstrom (for Youlgreave Ward) as follows:

- Residential Homes 548 (total includes second/empty/holiday homes)
- ♦ Second Homes 38
- Empty Homes 21 (3 empty for more than 2 years, 12 empty for more than 6 months)

#### ♦ Holiday Lets 43

# **Youlgrave Wildlife Notes: December 2024 & January 2025**

Snow on 5th January hung around for well over a week and since then the weather has been quite cold and very gloomy. Several species of birds have attracted a lot of attention. The little egret has been around since November and seems very tolerant of humans. I have watched it on several occasions,

just above Bradford . Bridge, fishina by disturbing the river bed with its huge yellow feet and grabbing fish as they try to escape. Bullheads seem to be its usual prey, which means it must turn them to swallow head first or they just wouldn't go down. Goosanders are big pale ducks with long serrated beaks that can hold on to captured fish. Some of them, too, will let you get very close Little egret with fish (photo by and I was able to watch Mark Ward). one swimming under

water recently. Whilst shyer than the egret and goosander, the kingfisher will often let you get close enough to admire its iridescent blue plumage while perched. Occasionally two have been seen together.

There have been a lot of mainly grevlag geese round the New Dam with the Canadas and these have been ioined occasionally by a few pink footed geese. They make a lot of noise as they fly in in skeins to congregate in the fields. On the river there have been occasional sightings of dippers and a dabchick has been higher up the river for some time. I first spotted two swans on the river on 2nd January. One was white, presumably adult, the other was a first winter cygnet. They were still around on the 19th but don't always

keep together. Mother and remaining young?

The cold weather has meant of lot of birds coming to garden feeders. We have plenty of finches, including bullfinch and siskin on ours plus the usual blue, great and coal tits, dunnocks robins and lots of blackbirds. tailed tits Long

> woodpeckers have been reported Stonechats have been seen near the New Dam and I saw one close to the egret just above Bradford Bridge. A very exciting visiting finch was a hawfinch briefly at the bottom of New Road. Buzzards are often seen and heard and kestrels can be found. Kites have been very scarce recently, but barn owls have been reported below Conksbury Lane. The occasional sparrowhawk has passed through gardens.



Quite large flocks of starlings have been seen, 600 was estimated doing a mini murmuration near the New Dam and other places. In early December a very noisy parrot was seen in the village. Probably a ring necked parakeet, as one was present in Bakewell recently.

The weather has not encouraged wild flowers, but on 2nd January we found 5 species in flower round the village. One of these was ripe hazel catkins, though we couldn't find any little red female flowers. On 15th January snowdrops were flowering in the churchyard.

# Pommie Panter returns for its fourth year


Youlgrave's premier Fell Race is back on Sunday 18th May – save the date!

For those familiar with our event, nothing has changed, we'll even have yet more glorious sunny weather.

For those not familiar with the UK's premier destination elite running event; 'The Panter' is Youlgrave's Fell Race organised by Youlgrave Harriers and the general village population (thanks!). It's a running race of 6ish miles under the Fell Running Association rules/licence. We start from outside Peak Feast and head up Moor Lane, do a full tour of all our hills on a loop and finish

by coming up Holywell and through the village to the finish line just past the shop near the George. The full route map is below and can be found on the Youlgrave Harriers webpage (www.youlgraveharriers.com).

All the fund raised (about £900 per year) go straight back into the Parish to spend on something villagey. Last year's money has been stashed to add into this year's funds to pay for a fun park pier with arcades, love lock railings and cider slushie stalls to leverage the financial



earning potential of the river. If that fails planning we're looking at a permanent table tennis table in the playground.

If you fancy running it and taking the overall win for the village and/or becoming officially the fastest local (the Bugle competition, local delivery area of the Bugle), pre entry is £6 the Youlgrave via Harriers website. Or you can enter on the day (we have 'sold out' of places each year, but we unofficially keep 'on the day' entry open for the village, though pre-entry makes our admin lots easier).

We'd really appreciate some help if you're free and not running. The main job is pointing runners in the right direction at the marshal places. Encouraging random people is an unexpectedly fun way of

spending lunchtime. The course is mostly taped and arrows, there's just a couple of turnings where we don't want people to overshoot and a couple of fields to cow watch. We'll only station you somewhere familiar and tool you up with blue piping if you're a cow whisperer. We start the race at 11.00, so you'd need to be in position before then. The winner usually gets round in 40 minutes and the last runner tends to be in by 12:30, so all done by 12:30. Then it's an after-party at the George. If you can help drop me an email at youlgraveharriers@gmail.com or ping me on 07960 637500; or flag any of us down when passing. Just coming out to support in the village really helps as



the big crowd in the road acts as a very effective traffic calming measure.
